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
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CHURCH FAMILY DAY CAMP AT ACADEMY

The auctions will happen in early May. Information on how to participate in the auction will be available after Easter.



Memorial UMC is set to launch its first-ever Stephen Ministry training program!

Have you heard of Stephen Ministry? It is a program where lay people are provided 50 hours of training in giving distinctively Christian Care to people in deep need.

Pastor Paul Denherder shares this about Stephen Ministry. "We all go through tough times in life. Times that are turbulent and unsettling. It can be extremely helpful to have someone come alongside us to give understanding and encouragement –to help us though the storm.

That is what a Stephen Minister is able to provide: a listening ear, a supportive perspective, and God's Word to help us through the challenges of life."

On April 4th about a dozen people from 3 congregations (Memorial UMC, Grace UMC, and St Paul's UMC) will begin the 50 hour training. Their training will conclude at the end of August.

Annual Conference Session Offering to Benefit Africa University

School Celebrates its 25th Anniversary this Year

The 2017 Annual Conference Session offering will benefit <u>Africa University</u> as the school celebrates its 25th anniversary this year.

Africa University aspires to become a world class university for leadership development in Africa. The mission of Africa University is to provide quality education within a Pan-African context through which persons can acquire general and professional knowledge and skills, grow in spiritual maturity, develop sound moral values, ethics and leadership qualities.

With an enrollment of more than 1,500 full-time students and 800 part-time students, Africa University, located in Old Mutare, Zimbabwe, to-day has more than 6,100 graduates from 32 African countries. More than half of the students (53 percent) are female — more than double other universities throughout Africa. The university offers undergraduate and graduate degree programs in agriculture and natural resources, education, health sciences, humanities and social sciences, management and administration, peace leadership and governance and theology.

Today Africa University boasts 6,200 alumni many of whom have gone on to serve in their countries in significant leadership positions. Countless people in the worldwide connection have supported the university with their prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness. Over the years, United Methodists have provided financial support through the Africa University Fund apportionment and World Service Special Gifts, bearing testimony to the high regard for AU within the connection.

A plan for the United Methodist-related university was presented to the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry in October 1987. Prompted by United Methodist plans to establish a continent-wide university in Zimbabwe where no private universities existed, President Robert Mugabe formed a government commission in 1987 to study the country's higher education needs and make recommendations about the role of private universities in the nation's overall education scheme.

At the 1988 General Conference, United Methodists overwhelmingly accepted the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry's proposal to begin the university. On the 6th of April 1991, thousands of people from throughout Zimbabwe watched as the groundbreaking ceremony took place and one acacia tree was planted at the Old Mutare Mission site of Africa University. In January 1992, President Robert Mugabe granted Africa University's Charter by official proclamation.

Finance

Income in January and February did not cover the bills for those two months. This is because we have major payments in January for insurance. The property insurance bill was \$10,163 for the year and the health insurance premium for the first quarter was \$7,273. This shortfall is an annual occurrence. The carryover from previous years helps with this, but often is not enough to keep from coming out behind early in the year.

The General Fund expenses for the two months totaled \$54,579. Total income was \$40,177. We were able to make the insurance payments and all other expenses excluding apportionments by using the \$2,015 carried over from 2016 and borrowing from our designated funds. At the end of February, the General Fund was short by \$12,388 which will need to be made up as the months go by. Extra contributions early in the year will help with this cash flow situation.

The Thrift Store raised enough to contribute \$3,500 for the Conference Tithe (apportionments). This payment toward the \$4,384 due for January and February was made at the end of March.

A major expense in March was the annual payment to Workman's Compensation Insurance which totaled \$2,430. And in April we will need to pay the second quarter health insurance premium of \$7,273.

Our estimates of giving totaling \$141,111 are up from last year and donors are keeping up with these estimates better than the first two months last year, falling only about \$1,300 behind so far.

As a church, we have many wonderful ministries that we are able to carry out, and many more that we carry in our hearts until we find a way to make them happen. We pray that each person associated with our church will find ways to help further God's kingdom

Thank you to everyone who continues to contribute generously to make our ministries possible.

Grace and peace be with you all! We are currently in the season of Lent, moving quickly toward Easter. It is a time to really focus on Paul's missional resolve,: "To know only Christ, and him crucified."

(1 Corinthian 2:2)

As I contemplate the ministry of MUMC – what is happening now, and where it will lead in the future – I have great hope. Certainly great changes will come. This is truly the work of God, and preparing ourselves to move forward with God will make all our transitions more grace-filled and holy. This is a wonderful congregation. Bishop Kelly used to remind us all, "God can do great things in the lives of people who refuse to put up barriers."

What type of barriers might we be unintentionally erecting in our hearts? In our minds? In our ministries?

Below is a wonderful reflection shared by our District Superintendent, Rev. Debra Brady. It refers to the story of Nicodemus' visit to Jesus, which is found in the third chapter of the Gospel of John. I hope you will find it thought provoking, as I did.

Dear Sisters and Brothers of the Central Valley,

I like rules. I am good at following rules. My husband will occasionally tease me about a time 30 years ago when we were walking to a parking garage late at night in downtown San Francisco. As we approached an intersection, I came to a stop. "Why are you stopping?" inquires Steve. "There's a red light and 'Don't Walk' sign," I said, explaining the obvious. Steve started laughing as he took my hand and led me across the completely empty street.

Following the rules is instinctual to me. Perhaps that is why Methodism was appealing to me as I was finding my way back to the journey of Christian discipleship. I like structure and order. They have served me well. Much of my work as a D.S. is interpreting rules and making sure pastors and churches follow the rules.

And yet I am also keenly aware that there is a false security in following the rules. The rules don't always lead us to do the right thing. The rules do not always equip us to adapt to the needs of our current mission context. A focus on obeying the rules can keep us from being a flexible and supple body that is sensitive to the movement of the Holy Spirit.

Nicodemus, a legal scholar who was well acquainted with institutional rules, came to Jesus by night. Many theories have been posited about why Nicodemus came at night. I tend to think it is because asking questions can be a risky thing to do in a system that rewards people for being good rule-followers. I think Nicodemus was intrigued by the ways Jesus' teachings were challenging rules. He engages Jesus in a series of questions attempting to get at the heart of the faith and make sense of things. John's gospel records Jesus's response:

The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit." Nicodemus said to him, "How can these things be?"

-John 3:8-9

As we continue our efforts to engage a new generation in disciple-making processes, I'm wondering how we can create a discipleship system built on inquiry. While rules will always be necessary, how can we create a community culture that encourages people to ask better questions and move with the Holy Spirit toward what is right and vital rather than what has been done in the past? Such an approach can make us uneasy. The wind of the Holy Spirit is not something we control. It leads us to wild and dangerous places where our rules do not serve us well. Let us take heart, however, that God is always with us and we need not be afraid.
