

Lenten Studies

In preparation for the coming Lenten season, we have a new study prepared. Some time ago, we followed the 24 Hours That Changed the World by Adam Hamilton. This year, we will study Hamilton's follow-up work, Final Words.



THE GOSPEL

"In 24 Hours That Changed the World, Adam Hamilton took us on a Lenten journey through the last day of Jesus' life. Now in this inspiring follow-up book, Hamilton explores Jesus' final words as seen and heard through the eyes and ears of those who stood near the cross.

Each chapter begins with the Biblical account followed by a firstperson story as might have been told from the viewpoint of one of

the characters at the cross. Then the chapter explores the meaning of Jesus' dying words for our lives today. Following the last statement, a postscript recounts the words Jesus spoke following his resurrection, including what truly were the final words Jesus spoke while walking this earth."



Dream Team

Beginning in August 2015 the congregation began a series of meetings and surveys and experiments to discern "What is the ministry God wants us to be doing, and how can we accomplish this ministry?"

Our surveys revealed that 80% of those responding believe strengthening our ministries with children and youth needs to be a high priority, and are willing to make changes to see this happen.

After initial "brainstorming" meetings, with follow up conversations and discussions at Network and AST meetings, our Lay Leader, Jim Jennings, chaired two pivotal meetings to which the entire congregation was invited to come and give input. At the first of these meetings, in June 2016, the congregation embarked on a series of different Sunday morning program schedules in an effort to get all our children and youth on campus at the same time.

At the second meeting, in September 2016, the current Sunday morning schedule was agreed upon. The decision took much time in discussion and listening to the struggles of the various ministries involved.

One HUGELY IMPORTANT discovery was, our buildings are not currently configured to allow us to expand our ministries. On Sunday mornings every space is occupied - we have no place to add additional classes or services. So if we grow our programs and need another class for children, youth or adults, we don't actually have a good place for them to meet.

AND, we are coming to a place where both MUMC and the people of Fresno Korean UMC would like to move to a greater partnership in ministry. This is SUPER exciting for the potential of offers all the ministries! BUT, again, we begin to bump into the limited space available in our buildings as they currently are.

To help us find a way to address this issue, both the Network and the Administrative Support Team/Trustees authorized a task force to be formed to investigate what upgrades and expansions are truly needed to enable our ministries to THRIVE. This task force has been named the "Dream Team," because they will help us realize our dreams to fully do the Ministry God wants us to be doing.

To date the Dream Team has been gathering in depth information about our current facilities, and the perceived needs for the ministries we hope to be doing. In other words, the Dream Team has been working to figure out where we are and where we want to go. Now they begin the earnest work of seeing what capital improvements need to be done to enable us to move from here to there.

Stay tuned for ongoing updates! Prayerfully consider becoming part of the Dream Team; this important work would benefit from more participation.

The next Dream Team meeting is February 12 at 2:30 pm in the Library.

Stephen Ministers are there:

...*after* the phone call you hoped you'd never get. ...*after* the divorce papers are served and the bottom falls out of your life.

...*after* the funeral, when everyone has left and the emotions you've held at bay come crashing in on you.

...*after* the doctor says, "I'm sorry, but the4re's nothing more we can do."

...*after* the nursing home director shakes your hand and says, "welcome to your new home." ...*after* the last child honks the horn, and waves, and drives away– and the house suddenly seems empty.

...*after* the gavel goes down, the handcuffs go on, and your loved one is led away.

...*after* the baby arrives, demanding more of you than you ever dreamed possible.

...*after* you find a pink slip with your final pay check.

...*after* your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but you still need to talk it out.

Stephen Ministers are the "After People." They are ready to come alongside you- or your friends, neighbors, coworkers, or relatives- and provide comfort and support for as long after as needed.

Finance

2016 Finance Report

The best financial news for 2016 is that all of Memorial's bills were paid and we were able to pay in full our apportionment tithe to the Conference. Our tithe for 2016 totaled \$30,592. This is the fifth year in a row that we have paid 100% of our apportionments.

This was despite the fact that our General Fund income for 2016 was down from the year before. Our total G.F. income for the year was \$265,021, a decrease of about \$36,000. Our expenses totaled \$277,432, an \$11,000 decrease over 2015. The \$15,000 carried over from 2015 allowed us to cover the difference between our income and expenses and give us a carry-over to 2017 of \$2,830.

The Thrift Shop contributed \$14,500 toward our Conference tithe and the Boutique added \$5,000. The Fall Fundraiser Western Dinner raised \$2,507 and the Hmong cuisine sales brought in \$2,496.

In addition to our General Fund income, we also raised \$3,299 for causes such as the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) for Imagine No Malaria, Fiji Relief and other projects. Additionally, we supported Stop Hunger Now, Heifer International, and our own pantry/emergency aid.

Among other projects that were funded were the youth Mission Trip to San Francisco, pew cushions Building Bridges with Native Americans, Christmas toys, support for the new Fresno Hmong congregation and Stephen's Ministry Leadership Training.

Thanks to all whose generosity made all these accomplishments possible.

From the Pastor

In 2006 my family took a driving vacation in which we followed about half of the "Lewis and Clark" expedition's trip. We picked up the trail in South Dakota, and ended up in Seaside, Oregon. Along the way we read excerpts from their journals.

Our entire trip was wonderful, with memories that continue to be family favorites.

As we read the journals we began to understand these brave explorers did not have any idea what they were getting themselves into when they agreed to go. Yet, they had committed to the cause, and did AMAZING things to faithfully complete their assigned task. (The task was to ascertain, is there a way to take goods by water from the eastern & central part of North America to the Pacific Ocean? The answer they discovered was - no.)

There were many hardships faced along the way. One of the most formidable obstacles was the Rocky Mountains. The men had crossed mountains before. But they had never experienced anything as towering as this massive range.

When they began ascending the mountain range, they were impressed by the challenge before them. These were big/ tall mountains for sure! When they got to the top -- they realized they had only cleared a lower ridge! There was another even bigger range yet to conquer! When they got to the top of that - there was another!! And so it went. BUT, they had committed to the task, so they kept going. Eventually they did cross what we now call "the continental divide," and started downhill toward the Pacific. It is important to note: the commitment was strong AND there was a group working together.

When we give our lives to Jesus we commit ourselves to the do the work God asks us to do, no matter what the challenge or cost. Sometimes we may think that we have made great progress in a service or task God has given us, only to discover there are even bigger obstacles ahead. When this happens, and it will happen in the life of every Christian, do not despair! When we start to feel, "I didn't sign up for THIS!" turn back to the one who laid down his life, and listen to the words of love and encouragement given to you over and over again in the scriptures. Remember, there is nothing being asked if you that is greater than what has already been done for you. AND

Look for the group of people God is bringing together to accomplish the work before you. Find community with which to work.

I hope that Memorial UMC can be such a community. The more we say "Yes!" to the opportunities God brings to us, the more we see God's power at work in our lives, in our ministry, and our community.

Shifting focus away from "I don't want to do this." or "Why do I have to do this?" to "Who will help me do this?" can be a turning point from disappointment and despair to strengthened resolve.

May God grant us grace to remain faithful followers of Jesus through the good times and the bad.


