## HMONG FUNERAL MINISTRY

New ministry to begin the "test" phase!!

Our Hmong Funeral Outreach Ministry has been moving forward well this year. This ministry seeks to provided affordable facilities to be used by Hmong Christian families for the 4 days needed for a funeral. MUMC will be assisting the families and overseeing the activities (overseeing, not conducting or providing worship services and meals) of the funeral. Grace UMC is providing their facilities for the funeral.

We give thanks to those on the executive team who are working to make this ministry a reality: from Grace UMC - Pastor Juan and Steve Whaite; from MUMC - Pastor Janette, Pai Yang, Andy Hansen-Smith and Stan & Guin Jenanyan.





Our initial test of this new ministry will happen in the next couple of months. There have been some changes made to the kitchen at Grace to better accommodate the needs for those cooking and cleaning up, and it is now ready for use.

Please hold this ministry in prayer as we seek to assist grieving families and to make a good witness for Jesus. Also prayerfully consider if you might be willing to assist with this ministry when we get ready for the full launch. We will need 30-40 people willing to donate 4-5 hours of time (one shift) on a weekend to be onsite at GUMC to be a supportive presence for the family. Training for this will likely happen this summer.



## Special Friends

Special friends met **January 9th** and thought about Compassion. With all that's going on in our world today it is easy to feel overwhelmed by the events that surround us. We questioned how are we able to reach out to hear the stories, see the wounds?

Joan Hallifax, a zen teacher and medical anthropologist, says compassion is "feeling alongside the suffers affect of state and very important, aspiring to relieve it." She distinguishes this from "empathy" where we feel the other person's suffering inside of us and are unable to distinguish our pain from the other's pain.

The editor of Alive Now feels this is an important distinction, as we learn to be persons of compassion in today's world. We can become overwhelmed when we take on the pain of others.

I think Jesus found the right balance. The scriptures tell us a little bit about how Jesus dealt with all the needs around him. First he took action: He touched people, listened to them and healed them. He gave of himself whenever he could. Second, he prayed: He lived his life through a series of "holy moments". He sought God, and made time for God. Third: he took time apart-he sought time to be alone with God.

As we think about how we can respond to the hurt and pain around us, let's hope we can remember Jesus' examples.

This month, we made 7 phone calls, wrote 14 notes and cards, and made 12 visits.

Closing thought: Can we find a healthy way to live with compassion?

Today's scripture reading came from Mark 8:34, Jesus said, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me." Our meditation is taken from the Jan-Feb Upper Room.

One of the fundamental aspects of Christianity is to witness. Christ calls his followers to share the good news of faith with others. For some of us, this charge to be a witness is daunting. Being Christ's Witness is an important task, and we want to get it right.

To share the good news of faith in Christ, we must first experience the good news for ourselves, and to experience the good news, we must know God. When we feel God's deep love for us, and feel secure and sustained by our relationship with God, we naturally want to share our experience with others. Thankfully, God has given us the gift of prayer so we can know and share our lives more fully with God.

This month we made 15 visits, 24 calls, and sent 22 cards and notes.

#### Finance

#### Mixed blessings for MUMC finances

With our fantastic year of finances in 2013, Memorial managed to carry over \$8,508 into the new year. This is fortunate since we had some major bills to pay In January. The largest amount was our annual payment for property insurance which totaled \$8,657. We also made our first installment on our 2014 apportionments in the amount of \$3,806.

Along with our other bills, our general fund payments for January totaled \$34,907. Our income was \$27,088. Adding this to our carry-over, we managed to end the month with a balance of \$690.

Our income fell off to \$19,439 in February, while our bills totaled \$22,685. With our January carry-over, that left us short by \$2,556 for the month. One major expense for the month was extensive tree pruning to remove unsafe limbs and other growth. This \$3,800 job was something that would not have been prudent to delay.

As we approach the end of March, it is clear that we will need to find ways to increase income in order to continue to fund necessary improvements for health and safety around the church, while keeping up with our monthly apportionments and other regular bills.

Thanks to everyone who has contributed. Your generosity makes all our ministries possible. It would be helpful if those who are behind in their estimate of giving could catch up. The estimates are behind by just about the same amount as what we needed to end February in the black. Ideas on other ways to increase income are always welcome.

#### From the Pastor

"In everything do to others as you would have them do to you; for this is the law and the prophets."

Matthew 7: 12

As I write this article, there is news that Fred Phelps, founder of the Westboro Baptist Church in Topeka, Kansas, is nearing death. This news is an opportunity for all of us to examine our inmost feelings, that there may be no hidden malice within us.

As you surely know, the members of Phelp's congregation, some 20 strong, have garnered international attention by flying to funerals and public events all over the US to picket with signs declaring God's hate for \_\_\_\_\_\_ (fill in the blank with any number of people, characteristics, causes or ideologies).

Many Christians have been angered by the attention given to this very small group of people. They believe, and probably rightly so, that to people who are not Christian, all Christians get grouped together with this message of hate, and worse. I have seen Christians and non-Christians joined to protest Phelps followers with signs about love, sometimes even forming a barrier obscuring the view of the hate-filled signs from those to whom the signs were most pointedly directed.

I have also seen people with signs that were more subtle than those of the Westboro group, but equally as derogatory. The term "hater" has come to common usage when speaking of the people of Westboro Baptist Church, or those who share their views. YET, that term is also derogatory, and invites those of differing views to devalue others in much the same way as those whom they criticize. This is not a "lesser sin." It is simply sin.

I am pleased that many people look with compassion on people who would wave hate-filled signs in the face of others. I am pleased with the myriad of grace-filled ways I have seen this pointed hate deflected or countered with love. I am pleased that many are seeking to genuinely be compassionate toward Fred Phelps, whose own life seemed to flaunt his lack of compassion. And I wonder if this compassion is generated, in part, because he his Christian? Because he is a brother in the faith, even if perceived as missing the mark, still we might be willing to extend the grace of Jesus to him in our hearts, knowing that sin is sin, and we, too, have sinned and are in need of grace.

I am wondering if that same grace is extended to people who are not Christians and to people who are not supportive of the US. Each of us must examine our hearts to see: what did we feel when Osama Bin Laden was killed? Even though he was not Christian, still God loved him. Did I love him like Jesus did? Did you? Was there joy or satisfaction in that news? How would we feel if we heard that Vladimir Putin had died?

A major focus for Christians during Lent is to seek those places where we allow sin and brokenness to dwell within us, and to surrender ourselves to God's healing love. Every day as we take in the news we can examine ourselves to see if we are truly following Jesus, or if there are people, maybe even whole groups of people, we feel justified in devaluing or even hating. Remember, too:

"There is no fear in love. But perfect love drives out fear, because fear has to do with punishment. The one who fears is not made perfect in love." (1 John 4:18 NIVUK)

Our world has many crises happening - some caused by nature, many human made. The world needs Jesus. WE are the body of Christ for the world today. In the weeks ahead I encourage each of us to seek God's wisdom and guidance, that we might be rid of malice toward others, and become increasingly faithful followers of Jesus.
